


One of the central concepts of Jewish spirituality is drawn from the world of Kabbalah, the Jewish mystical tradition. It is the term reshimu. This Aramaic word is used to describe the minute trace, the "imprint" that is left after a great light (G-d or the Divine) fills and inudates a space, and then withdraws.

The great light can also be understood to be a profound insight, or a religious experience, or even a moment of great love. The point is that, whatever the great light is, it disappears very quickly, and unless something is absorbed, something is changed, something is transformed, it is really as if nothing had happened. And so one of the concerns of the spiritual life is that there be a reshimu, an imprint, from any spiritual experience. It is not enough that we experience the Divine; not enough that we get "high" on our religious insight; we must be "imprinted" by it, be transformed by it.

This is the challenge of reshimu.

And of course, the classes with Danny Matt were both intellectually and spiritually amazing and awesome.









The Kabbalistic Tree of Life A Map of Awareness
